The New England Lions Council has invited all New England Lions to the 5th Annual New England Lions Evening to Benefit LCIF on Saturday, February 24th from 3:00 pm to 11:00 pm at the Holiday Inn, Marlborough, MA. The cost of the event (including the banquet meal) is \$40 per person and is open to all Lions and guests.

Hotel reservations should be made directly with the Holiday Inn, Marlborough, at 1-508-481-3000. Ask for The New England Lions Council group rate of \$89.00 per night plus tax (single/double occupancy) for Friday and/or Saturday. Due to a limited number of rooms at the group rate, please make your reservation as soon as possible if you plan on attending and staying overnight. The deadline is February 1,2007.

This event offers a unique, once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for an individual to have a Melvin Jones Fellowship personally presented by this years's LCIF Chairman, Past International President Ashok Mehta. The individual presentations will be scheduled between 3 pm and 5:30 pm on Saturday, February 24th immediately prior to the cash bar reception and 7 pm banquet. Each recipient will receive a photograph of the presentation and a press release to use in the local newspaper.

Since the Danbury Club usually presents new Melvin Jones at our annual installation and awards banquet, we will not be making presentations at the event but we can still attend individually or as a group. Lion Aneel Sarfraz of the Pakistan Lions sent us the article in the next column on our founder, Melvin Jones. Currently, there are 50 Melvin Jones Fellows in our club and we will be looking to add to that number in our Sight First II campaign.

I have included Sight First II information in this issue and as soon as we name a Chairman to head the fund raising efforts there will be more on the subject.

Melvin Jones - Founder of Lions Clubs International

Melvin Jones was born on January 13, 1879 in Fort Thomas, Arizona, the son of a United States Army captain who commanded a troop of scouts. Later, his father was transferred and the family moved east. As a young man, Melvin Jones made his home in Chicago, Illinois, became associated with an insurance firm and in 1913 formed his own agency.

He soon joined the Business Circle, a businessmen's luncheon group, and was shortly elected secretary. This group was one of many at that time devoted solely to promoting the financial interests of their membership. Because of their limited appeal, they were destined to disappear. Melvin Jones, however, had other plans. "What if these men," he asked, "who are successful because of their drive, intelligence and ambition, were to put their talents to work improving their communities?" Thus, at his invitation, delegates from men's clubs met in Chicago to lay the groundwork for such an organization and on June 7, 1917, Lions Clubs International was born.

Melvin Jones eventually abandoned his insurance agency to devote himself full time to Lions at International Headquarters in Chicago. It was under his dynamic leadership that Lions Clubs earned the prestige necessary to attract civic-minded members.

The association's founder was also recognized as a leader outside the association. One of his greatest honors was in 1945 when he represented Lions Clubs International as a consultant in San Francisco, California, at the organization of the United Nations.

Melvin Jones, the man whose personal code "You can't get very far until you start doing something for somebody else" became a guiding principle for public-spirited people the world over, died June 1, 1961 at 82 years of age.

We have always held a raffle with some more successful than others but discussions have taken place about possibly doing a different type of event. Campaign SightFirst II Lions' Vision for All

Campaign SightFirst II is the Lions' global initiative to raise a minimum of \$150 million to continue and expand SightFirst programs. Since 1990, SightFirst has prevented or restored vision for 24 million people, but the funding for these highly successful programs is nearly depleted. Through Campaign SightFirst II (CSFII), Lions seek to fund programs that will combat the existing and new threats to sight.

Lions Clubs around the world are being asked to once again challenge themselves to set a goal at the highest possible level. Our **Danbury Board of Directors** has made the commitment to participate in fund raising for CSFII in 2007-2008. They have also concurred with International's guidelines that a Club of our size (over 100 members) and with the number of Melvin Jones members we already have that a challenge goal of **\$50,000** is within our reach. We have already secured Board of Director pledges in the amount of \$8,000! We're on our way to our Club goal even before our pledge year begins! What a great start!

Why Should I be Proud to Participate in Campaign SightFirst II?

1. Many groups are working to solve the problems of blindness and low vision, but we as Lions, the largest service organization in the world and the worldwide leader in the fight against blindness, have a special responsibility.
2. For CSFII to be successful, the participation of all Lions is essential. By our commitment to participate and achieve at the highest possible level, we can and will make the difference in the success of CSFII.
3. Through CSFII, Lions can continue to advance the SightFirst program and alleviate preventable blindness in many parts of the world. Over the last 15 years, Lions' SightFirst program has provided \$185 million in grants, benefited 80 countries, funded 4.6 million cataract surgeries

and 65 million treatments for river blindness, built or expanded 258 eye hospitals, upgraded 300 eye care centers and educated 68,000 health workers – CSFII will enable Lions to continue their global leadership in the fight against blindness

How Will Funds be Raised?

1. Lions' personal gifts and or pledges.
2. Personal gifts and or pledges from Non-Lions
3. Club fund-raising events and activities
4. Matching or outright gifts and/or pledges from the Club treasury.

Ideally, and what is recommended, is that we use all Four parts of this "Comprehensive Method". Clubs are Encouraged to use the methods of fund raising that Have been successful for us in the past, but with an Added sense of urgency and enthusiasm due to the Magnitude and importance of SCFII.

Pledges are emphasized because they allow donors to consider giving more than is possible through "one-time gifts". Pledges are a commitment or promise, not a legally binding contract. Each donor will be given the opportunity to make a pledge to CFSII. Pledges are payable over a three- to five- year period. Statements will be mailed from LCIF to donors, you hopefully, on a monthly, quarterly, semi-annual or annual basis according to the donor's wish.
